Letter from the Manse....

We live today in dangerous and anxious times. Terrorist attacks in Paris, Beirut, Egypt, Mali, Iraq, Pakistan...and many other places have cast a shadow over us all. These are dark and difficult days especially for those who have been personally affected.

One of the immediate and heartfelt responses following the shooting in Paris was a social media call to prayer. The hashtag #prayforparis was sent from person to person the world over – an indication of genuine love and a deep longing for help in the midst of this distress.



Men and women often have turned to prayer in their times of deepest need to seek after the mercy and grace of God. As Christian believers we know that through Jesus God listens to the prayers of his children and He can be known and experienced as our refuge and our strength. Jesus, of course, encouraged his followers to pray – the words which he taught many of us came to know as children. The Lord's Prayer is precious and it is powerful.

The Church of England put together a one minute video presentation of the Lord's prayer to be shown in cinemas in the week leading up to Christmas. However, the cinemas decided that the film was unsuitable since it might cause offence to some people. The mind boggles given that cinemas are happy to show adverts for alcohol, gambling, violent computer games and much more.

Yes there is much darkness in the world today and so there is no better time to pray. This advent let's remember again how, in Jesus, light, life and hope came to the aid of the world. In those dark days thank God for what Christmas means.

John 1 reminds us *"⁵The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it...⁹The true light that gives light to everyone was coming into the world. ¹⁰He was in the world, and though the world was made through him, the world did not recognise him. ¹¹He came to that which was his own, but his own did not receive him. ¹²Yet to all who did receive him, to those who believed in his name, he gave the right to become children of God – ¹³children born not of natural descent, nor of human decision or a husband's will, but born of God. ¹⁴The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us. We have seen his glory, the glory of the one and only Son, who came from the Father, full of grace and truth."*

The Christian Year

The life and worship of the Church centres round the great events of Jesus's life and the most significant experience of God's intervention in the life of the infant Church. That means Christmas, when Christ was born, then Easter when Christ died and rose again and finally the coming of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost which guaranteed God's continuing presence and power in the life of the Church. Each year we repeat that pattern of celebration and remembering.



The year begins with Advent, the weeks of preparation for Christmas when we look at God's promises in the Old Testament speaking of the coming of one to be our Saviour and Messiah. This was fulfilled by the birth of Christ at Christmas. Following on from this we can spend the next weeks thinking about the life and ministry of Jesus leading up to Easter, including the period called Lent in which we are led through the journey of Jesus to Jerusalem. The death and rising are remembered and celebrated over Easter. With the resurrection we begin to think of the results of this on the

Church, the people of God and this takes us into the study of the early days of the Church in the New Testament. We can also think then about the leading of God in this life of the Israelite community as the Old Testament tells it. Finally we get back to the Advent again and the whole circle repeats. We don't follow this slavishly but it is a handy way of covering the essential truths of Christ's Gospel

Here are some memory verses for the coming months that follow this pattern.

DECEMBER: ISAIAH CH.7 vs14

"Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign: The Virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son and will call him Emmanuel."

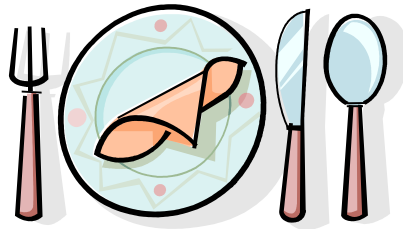
JANUARY: MATTHEW CH.2 vs2

"Where is the one who has been born the King of the Jews? We saw his star in the east and have come to worship him"

FEBRUARY: ACTS CH.2 vs22

"Men of Israel, listen to this: Jesus of Nazareth was a man accredited by God to you by miracles, wonders and signs which God did among you through him, as you yourselves know"

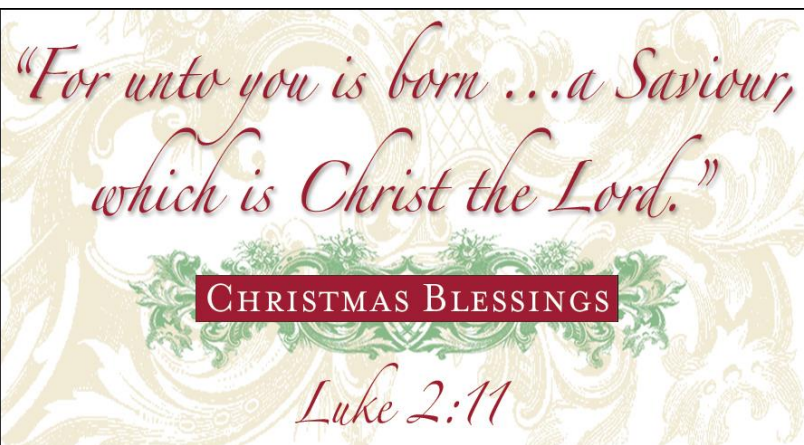

PRAYER DAY

Just after New Year last year we held a "Day of Prayer" between the morning and evening services. Frankly this was a bit of an experiment for we had no idea how it would go! Happily it went extremely well with over forty people attending for at least part of the time.

There was a very relaxed atmosphere with the people feeling free to come and go as the pattern of the day dictated, just as had been suggested. All the groups and organisations associated with our church were represented and prayed for. We also remembered groups in the community in which our church plays a part. We had a time-table indicating when particular organisations were being prayed for and a list of suggested topics to help people take part. It was stressed of course that it was not essential for everyone present to feel obliged to take part, for there is real value in silent prayer too and this is also encouraged. It was lovely to hear so many different people praying and to feel part of a real family in which everyone was involved and concerned.

Now we plan to repeat this in the New Year around the same time. The date for this year's event is **SUNDAY 10TH JANUARY**. We will follow a similar pattern. Fuller details will be published nearer the time. This is meant to give everyone preliminary warning for lots of people said how much they appreciated this opportunity for sharing and we are sure they will want to keep a space for it in their diaries. *We hope you will be one of those attending.*

The Story Behind The Hymn: Silent Night

Silent Night is a popular Christmas carol, composed in 1818 by Franz Xaver Gruber to lyrics by Joseph Mohr in the small town of Oberndorf bei Salzburg, Austria. The song has been recorded by a large number of singers from every music genre. The version sung by Bing Crosby is the third best-selling single of all-time. The song was first performed on Christmas Eve 1818 at St Nicholas parish church in Oberndorf, a village in the Austrian Empire on the Salzach River in present-day Austria. A young priest, Father Joseph Mohr, had come to Oberndorf the year before. He had already written the lyrics of the song



"Stille Nacht" in 1816 at Mariapfarr, the hometown of his father in the Salzburg Lungau region, where Joseph had worked as a coadjutor. The melody was composed by Franz Xaver Gruber, schoolmaster and organist in the nearby village of Arnsdorf. Before Christmas Eve, Mohr brought the words to Gruber and asked him to compose a melody and guitar accompaniment for the church service. Both performed the carol during the mass on the night of December 24. The original manuscript has been lost. However a manuscript was discovered in 1995 in Mohr's handwriting and dated by researchers 1820. It shows that Mohr wrote the words in 1816 when he was assigned to a pilgrim church in Mariapfarr, Austria, and shows that the music was composed by Gruber in 1818. This is the earliest manuscript that exists and the only one in Mohr's handwriting.

In 1859, the Episcopal priest John Freeman Young, then serving at Trinity Church, New York City, published the English translation that is most frequently sung today. The version of the melody that is generally used today is a slow, meditative lullaby, differing slightly from Gruber's original, which was a sprightly, dance-like tune.

The carol has been translated into about 140 languages.

The song was sung simultaneously in English and German by troops during the Christmas truce of 1914 during World War I, as it was one carol that soldiers on both sides of the front line knew.

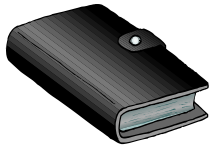


LMN

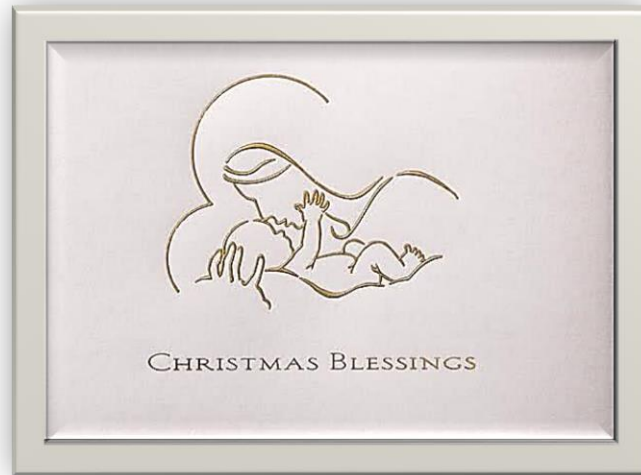
