From The Manse.....

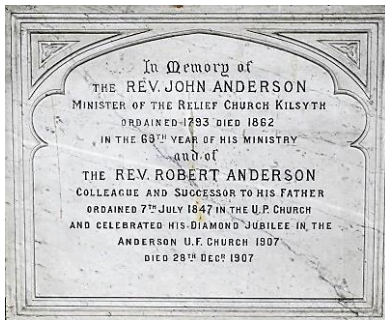


What's in a name? Well, names are chosen for a variety of reasons, sometimes we pick a name based on the beauty of the name to our own sense, the sound of it perhaps. Sometimes it is related to a connection it has or a memory it evokes. The name given to the church here in Kingston Road, Kilsyth – **the Kilsyth Anderson Memorial Parish Church** is because it makes a reference back to a time when two ministers served this congregation faithfully for almost 100 years between them. Let me tell you a little of these two remarkable men.

The first is Rev John Anderson M.A. John Anderson was born on the 15th of June 1770 in Falkirk (Gutterhead). His ministerial training was at Glasgow University, with some classes in Edinburgh. He was known as a keen thinker and good preacher and within a few months of being finished with his studies, he was approached by three congregations who asked that he would be their minister. John chose Kilsyth and was ordained on the 12th of September 1793 in what was then called the Kilsyth Relief Church. Rev Anderson served the church here in Kilsyth over a 69-year period!! A son of Rev John Anderson, called Robert, came to serve alongside him in 1847 and continued ministering in Kilsyth until his death in 1890.



Rev John Anderson ministered during a period in history in which the French Revolution and the Napoleonic Wars took place. These were sometimes very hard times in Scotland, during which John Anderson was known as a compassionate pastor to his flock, many of whom were desperately poor and sometimes literally starving. His help for the unfortunate was both spiritual and, from his own pocket, practical. There were thankfully also good and settled times and in these, John, was to enjoy a large family around him; he had 14 children. As a father, he was known for his strict approach to discipline in the household, but always with a desire to instil good Christian values.



Rev John Anderson was notable for his early approval of the use of instrumental music in public worship. He held that even though the scriptures encouraged praise with a variety of instruments, the church chose to 'follow its own cunningly devised fables' to prevent it. It was another son of the Kilsyth manse, Rev Dr William Anderson whose famous 'Apology for the Organ' pamphlet helped eventually bring about change.

Church services during that time began at 11am and continued until 2pm. The sermon usually lasted for about 45 minutes!

Rev Robert Anderson was, like his father, known for his preaching which attracted a sizeable congregation. In addition to his other duties, education was a key concern for Robert, knowing the many men and women of the district could not even read. At his own expense Robert started a night school and when the government passed the Education Act, naturally it was Robert who was appointed as the chairman.

Both John and Robert Anderson were men of confident Christian faith and both well-respected ministers and faithful preachers of the Gospel. It is for their service to Christ and the local community that the congregation unanimously chose to name the new church building after them – quite an accolade yet not one desired or expected.

I began by asking the question, 'What's in a name?' Well, for all that it is great for our church building named after such eminent individuals, we must always remember that there is always a name which is above all other names – and that is **Jesus**. The meaning of the name Jesus holds within it not simply a link to history of the past but also to the future, you see, the name literally means Jehovah saves or Jehovah is salvation. This is a reminder to us of where we need to place our faith for our future.

This Christmas season you are invited again to recall that Jesus is the one who serves and who saves and to follow him.

May Christmas be a blessing to you all.

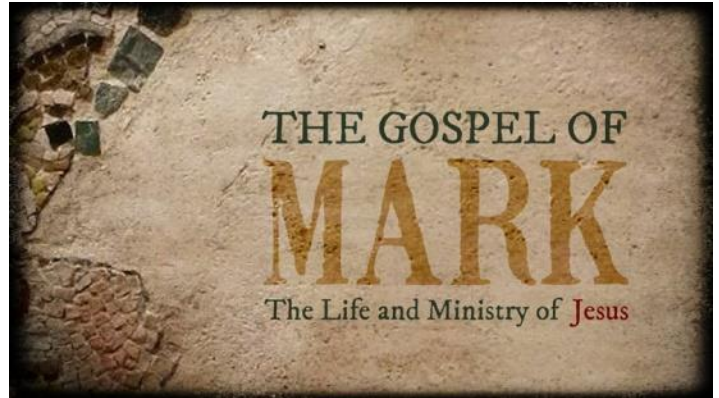

Read Mark and Learn

The start of Advent marks the beginning of the Christian year. Between now and Easter is the perfect time to learn more about the life of Jesus. That life is outlined in the four Gospels. Now these are not biographies in the ordinary sense of telling the story of a life. They are much



more. They have been written from a particular point of view and for a particular purpose. The point of view is that Jesus was the promised Christ and had come from God to redeem the world. The particular purpose is to lead the reader through the great acts of Christ's life to convince them too of the truth of Christ's claim to be the Son of God sent to give his life for the world. By the time you come to the end of the Gospel Christ you should be in a position to come to a decision for or against the claim of Christ. This makes the Gospels very special indeed as proclamation of the Good News.

Have you ever read through a whole Gospel like this?

I recommend it to you and now is the perfect time to begin. I suggest you read the Gospel of Luke, for it is a lovely gentle and caring book that reveals a Christ who reaches out to the world in love and who gives himself freely in a sacrificial death for us. It has been called the most beautiful book in the world - it contains the story of Jesus' birth and of the boy in the Temple. It tells of Jesus' temptation and gives his manifesto of good news to the poor. It tells of his caring for the lepers, speaks of a Centurion's faith and of the Prodigal Son who comes home to his father. It tells of the Good Samaritan and the conversion of Zacchaeus, the tax collector. It outlines Christ's experience in the Garden of Gethsemane and betrayal by Judas. It ends with the Crucifixion and the amazing fact of the Resurrection and finally the appearance to the disciples on the road to Emmaus. I suggest you read it through slowly, regularly reflecting on what the writer is telling us and at the end pause and ask yourself whether you believe Jesus is your Saviour and Lord. You will find it life changing. Here are some verses for you as you journey.

DECEMBER: LUKE 1 Vs35

The angel answered: "The Holy Spirit will come upon you and the power of the Most High will overshadow you. So the Holy one to be born will be called the Son of God"

JANUARY: LUKE2 Vs49

"Why were you searching for me?" he asked. "Didn't you know I had to be in my Father's house?"

FEBRUARY: LUKE4 Vs13

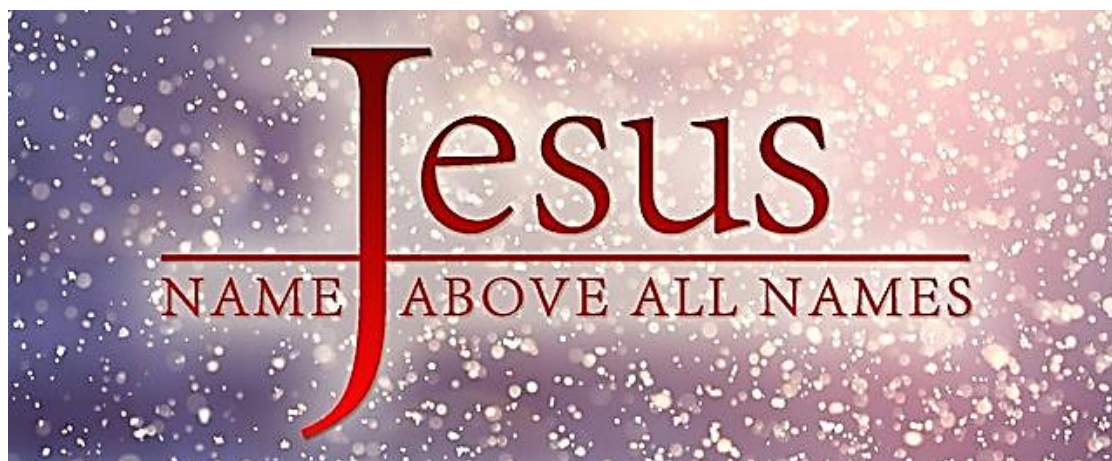

Calypso Carol

(See him lying on a bed of straw)



The **Calypso Carol** is a popular modern Christmas carol, with the opening line "See him lying on a bed of straw". It has often been introduced by BBC announcers and others as a traditional folk carol from the West Indies. The calypso of the title refers to its West Indian flavour, and the words have featured on a set of Caribbean postage stamps. However, both words and music were written by an Englishman, Michael Perry, Michael Arnold Perry (8 March 1942 – 9 December 1996) was a Church of England clergyman and one of the leading British hymnodists of the 20th century. He was closely associated with Jubilate Hymns. Michael Perry was born in Beckenham, Kent on 8 March 1942. He was educated at Dulwich College and went on to study at University College London; Oak Hill Theological College, London; Ridley Hall, Cambridge; and University of Southampton. It was during his student days at Oak Hill in 1964 that Perry wrote his best-known hymn, the Calypso Carol, the first line of which is "See him lying on a bed of straw" He wrote this for a college concert, and it only became famous by accident when Cliff Richard substituted it for a missing recording in a radio show. After ordination in the Church of England Diocese of Liverpool, Perry ministered at St Helens, Merseyside. He moved to Bitterne, Southampton, Hampshire, where he was curate and then vicar. During his time at Bitterne he was on the committees that produced the popular hymn books *Psalm Praise* (1973) and *Hymns for Today's Church* (1982). From 1981 to 1989 Perry served as Rector of Eversley, Hampshire. In 1982 he became Secretary of Jubilate Hymns, and was involved in editing most of their books. In addition, he worked as Chaplain and lecturer at the National Police Staff College, Bramshill. He was also elected to the Church of England's General Synod in 1985. Perry's last posting was as Vicar of Tonbridge in his native Kent from 1989 until 1996. He was appointed Chairman of the Church Pastoral Aid Society in 1993, and again to the General Synod in 1994. Perry married Beatrice Mary at St Helens Parish Church in 1967. They had two children, Helen and Simon. From early 1996 Perry was increasingly disabled by an inoperable brain tumour. He died at home on 9 December 1996.

500th Anniversary of the Reformation



On October 31, 1517, Martin Luther, a young monk, published 95 criticisms of the Catholic Church practice of selling Indulgences – famously he did that by nailing them to the church door! He intended to bring about reformation within Catholicism, not break it apart, however, in the end, he did both, beginning what would be a long, difficult and dangerous task. The criticisms Luther made are called the ‘Ninety-Five Theses’, and it is worth looking at a few of them to get a flavour of what Luther was saying,

1. *When our Lord and Master Jesus Christ said, “Repent” (Mt 4:17), he willed the entire life of believers to be one of repentance.*
5. *The pope neither desires nor is able to remit any penalties except those imposed by his own authority or that of the canons.*
21. *Thus those indulgence preachers are in error who say that a man is absolved from every penalty and saved by papal indulgences.*
27. *They preach only human doctrines who say that as soon as the money clinks into the money chest, the soul flies out of purgatory.*
36. *Any truly repentant Christian has a right to full remission of penalty and guilt, even without indulgence letters.*
37. *Any true Christian, whether living or dead, participates in all the blessings of Christ and the church; and this is granted him by God, even without indulgence letters.*
62. *The true treasure of the church is the most holy gospel of the glory and grace of God.*
94. *Christians should be exhorted to be diligent in following Christ, their Head, through penalties, death and hell.*
95. *And thus be confident of entering into heaven through many tribulations rather than through the false security of peace (Acts 14:22).*

Luther’s concern was truth – truth as it is revealed in the Bible. The Bible was his guide in thinking through what was right and wrong about the way the church operated. The selling of indulgences (tokens to release dead relatives from a place called ‘purgatory’). Luther saw this practice as a clear abuse of power by the church and an unbiblical money raising exercise. The call of Luther was on the Pope to stop this practice. His criticisms, however, placed him in real danger of his life, and he had to flee. At a later trial, in a place called Worms, he was told by the church authorities that he had to recant of his criticisms of the church. The famous reply Luther gives provides us with a clear indication of his focus and his strength of conviction.

“I am bound by the Scriptures I have quoted and my conscience is captive to the Word of God. I cannot and I will not retract anything, since it is neither safe nor right to go against conscience. I cannot do otherwise, here I stand, may God help me, Amen.”

This first step led Luther and others on to give fuller expression to what was to become the keys towards understanding the Protestant Reformation; we refer to them as ‘The Five Solas’, essentially the five fundamentals on which the Church is built, they are:

1. **Sola Scriptura** (“Scripture alone”): The Bible alone is our highest authority.
2. **Sola Fide** (“faith alone”): We are saved through faith alone in Jesus Christ.
3. **Sola Gratia** (“grace alone”): We are saved by the grace of God alone.
4. **Solus Christus** (“Christ alone”): Jesus Christ alone is our Lord, Saviour, and King.
5. **Soli Deo Gloria** (“to the glory of God alone”): We live for the glory of God alone

In due course, the Roman Catholic underwent its own reformation and today these fundamentals are not disputed as they were back at the time of Luther. It is however still all too easy for the Church and for individual Christians to fall into error when these five keys are not observed and when we look toward other authorities and other paths towards salvation.

Luther may be history but what he highlighted is as relevant today as ever.

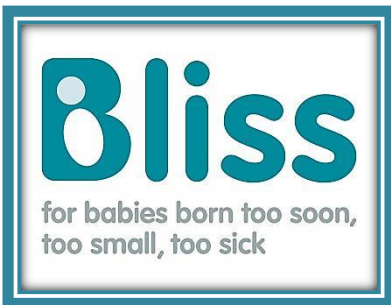
Best Wishes to All from 2nd Kilsyth Girls' Brigade Company

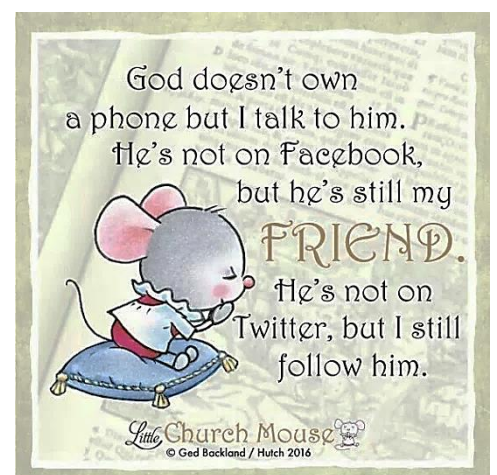

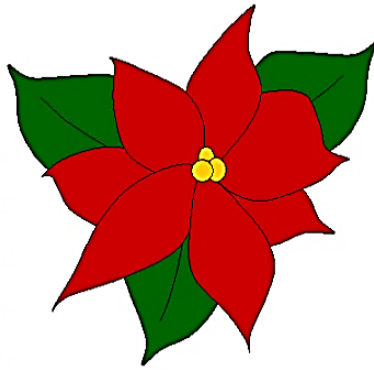
LMN

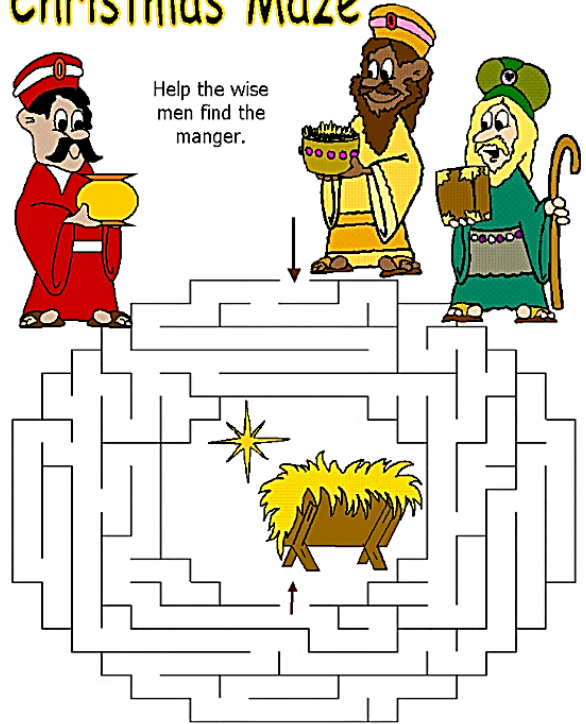

Poinsettia

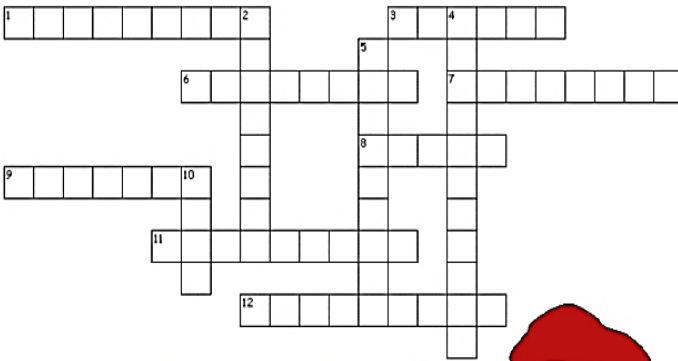




Christmas Maze

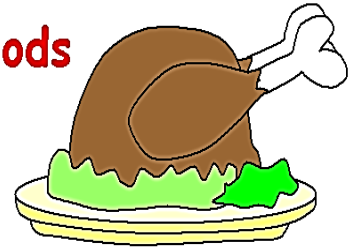
