Out of our time together the Kirk Session workgroups now have a

One place Lynne and I visited on our travels was Pluscarden Abbey, a place of Christian worship going back to the 13<sup>th</sup> century. It was an impressive place which has undergone



turbulent times having been brought to ruin before a rebuilding project began in 1948.

Our other church visit was on Sunday to Inshes church in Inverness – this time a church building in the midst of a retail park which was opened only in 2007. ### O LOVE THAT WILT NOT LET ME GO

GEORGE MATHESON (1842 –1906)



Born in Glasgow, he was the eldest of eight. He was educated at Glasgow Academy and the University of Glasgow, where he graduated first in classics, logic and philosophy. In his twentieth year he became totally blind but he held to his resolve to enter the ministry, and gave himself to theological and historical study. In 1879 the University of Edinburgh conferred upon him the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity. In 1890 he became a

fellow of the Royal Society of Edinburgh. He started as an assistant pastor in 1866. His first ministry began in 1868 at Innellan, on the Argyll coast. He stayed 18 years. In 1886 he moved to Edinburgh, where he became minister of St. Bernard's Parish Church for 13 years. He was invited to preach in front of Queen Victoria at Balmoral. In 1879, he declined an invitation to the pastorate of Crown Court, London. In 1881 he was chosen as Baird lecturer, and in 1882 he was the St Giles lecturer. In 1890 he was elected a fellow of the Royal Society of Edinburgh, the University of Aberdeen gave him its honorary Doctorate of Law, and in 1899 he was appointed Gifford lecturer by that university, but declined on grounds of health. In the same year he severed his active connection with St. Bernard's.

"O Love That Wilt Not Let Me Go" was written on the evening of Matheson's sister's marriage. Years before, he had been engaged, until his fiancée learned that he was going blind that there was nothing the doctors could do and she told him that she could not go through life with a blind man He went blind while studying for the ministry and his sister had been the one to care for him through the years, but now she was gone. He was now 40, and his sister's marriage brought a fresh reminder of his own heartbreak. It was in the midst of this circumstance and intense sadness that the Lord gave Matheson this hymn, which he said was written in five minutes.

He died suddenly on the 28th of August 1906 in Edinburgh and is buried in the Glasgow Necropolis. He never married.

"O Love That Wilt Not Let Me Go," has passed into the popular hymnology of the Christian Church.

#### DR BILL SEWELL 1923-2014

Dr. Sewell's son, Kenneth asked me to include a piece about his Dad in our magazine:



Bill sadly passed away on 26th May very suddenly but peacefully at home. A GP in the town for 37 years, originally from Edinburgh, but fell in love with the town, & remained here for the duration of his working life. He made many friends, as was shown by the turnout for his funeral in the church. A well respected gentlemen, known to many as simply, ' The Doctor', he was always ready for a chin wag, & probably more so in his retirement. After Nan passed away, he found the garden & house too big, & downsized to a flat in Kirkintilloch, 100yds from his youngest son Kenneth & his family. He didn't have far to go for his evening meal, & was always welcomed by Kenneth, Gillian & his grandsons, although he tended to

hog the TV remote!. He was a very frequent visitor to Kilsyth, and was often accosted in the Main St. He used to say it took him twice as long to shop there, as he met so many old friends & patients. On behalf of the family, can I thank the church family at the Anderson, who gave great support to us on Dad's passing, To Allan, who was so supportive, understanding, & diplomatic, & as one mourner said, 'What a great funeral.' A special thanks to all who helped on the day of the funeral, which made it easier on us. I would also like to thank Molly Muirhead, for the flowers in the church, which she donated. The retiral offering raised the sum of £670, which was divided between Yorkhill Children's Foundation & Cancer Concern

# The Perfect Pattern

In the last issue we began to look at the Lord's Prayer which Jesus taught his disciples as a pattern for their regular use. So it is with us today, of course as we regularly in our worship

After properly addressing God as our Heavenly Father we are then taught to pray for the hallowing of God's name. That is the right place for this petition. Having a right attitude toward God must be the start of any conversation with Him.



To hallow God's name means to treat it as holy and special, which sadly we rarely do today. The Jews of Jesus's day regarded the name of God as so special that they would hardly dare say it. They found other forms by which to refer to God so holy was the name 'Yahweh' we pray. So when we pray we are to be aware of who God is. He is holy and his name must be glorified. That means that we recognise the huge gap between us. He is the Lord with all that this implies: powerful, majestic, all knowing, all judging but also all loving and all gracious. There is a huge balance here and a tension as he now comes toward us in his grace and mercy and now goes far from us in his majesty and mystery. How important then to have right thought about this hallowed one.


We must also have right usage of the name. This is we must not fall into the trap of blasphemy that is so common. People use the name of God with thoughtless casualness. That is far from treating his name as hallowed.

Not least his name must be hallowed in our daily lives, in our actions, in our behaviour and in our attitudes, we have to live as Christians as those who honour God in every aspect of our lives. Finally we have to hallow God's name in our worship. What we offer must perfectly reflect who we are addressing and how we seek to glorify him. Even a human monarch has to be properly addressed, how much more does God require and deserve this respect of us.

Now you will recognise that many of these remarks also would apply to the opening

requirements of the Ten Commandments. This is not accidental for God is one and

constant, so let His name be hallowed both now and eternally






#### **REPORT PRAYER MEETING & BIBLE STUDY**

This meeting on a Thursday night is very similar to the early church we read about in Acts 2 v 42 where it says `they devoted themselves to the apostles teaching, fellowship, the breaking of bread and to prayer'. It is a very relaxed meeting where 10 - 16 people meet together to study the Bible and to pray. We have not had communion together as yet but have shared food and fellowship.

This last session we have used Scripture Union study books to look at `The I am sayings of Jesus' in John's gospel and in-depth study of the last week of Jesus life over the Easter period. These have been led by one of the fellowship. Using a DVD we have also sat and listened to teaching on the Beatitudes by renowned Keswick speakers. All the teaching sessions encourage lively discussion and those attending feel free to express their opinions and doubts or just quietly and listen.



Prayer is an important part of the evening when the needs of the world and more local issues are brought before God. While it is good to verbalise our prayers it is recognised not everyone is comfortable with this it but can add their Amen to the prayers of others,

We also read in Acts 2 the early church gave to those in need so this session we gave a donation to Christian Solidarity for persecuted Christians in North Korea. We are anxious that others study the Bible so have funded our Daily Bread Bible reading notes used by a number of our congregation and also the Penny Gospels by the Scottish Bible Society given out during Civic Week.

### Boys' Brigade - Report for 2013-2014



Numbers have remained steady this year with a total membership of around 70 Boys.

All Boys achieved the badges which they were due to receive at our two parents' nights held in May. A large number of Company Section Boys received promotions to NCO rank - junior leadership within the company.

During the year there have been a number of highlights -

At the start of the session we had a fun afternoon when a number of cars went off on a treasure hunt followed by a BBQ in the Manse grounds. Because of the inclement weather, the outdoor activities which had been planned were scrapped in favour of table top games in the hall. Many adults enjoyed reliving their childhood playing Snakes and Ladders, Connect Four, Hungry Hippos etc.

October saw the 130th Anniversary of the founding of the BB. We celebrated with an overnight games session (sponsored, of course) when the Boys played 130 games. The Company section Boys were joined in the morning by the Anchor Boys and Junior Section at which point the cake was cut and the younger Boys continued to play the games. Company Section went off to bed! Over £800 was raised towards refurbishing the school in Malawi.

In November we had 10 senior Boys attending a number of courses at Carronvale - part of their leadership qualification for their Queen's Badge.

During December we delivered Christmas cards - £3000 again and we bag packed in the Coop to add to the fund for Malawi. Over £700 was raised.

We welcomed James Murray into the company for one session. He had studied here, met his wife here, and was biding time until Beth was able to finish her degree. James was a great asset, working with the Company Section Boys and

bringing to them his journey in his Christian Faith. James is hoping to go into ministry back in his native Northern Ireland and we wish him and Beth God's blessing for their future life together and pray that James's desire to enter the ministry will come to fruition.

During January, our officer in charge of the Company Section, Scott Anderson, went off to work in London for a year. We hope that he has settled in to life in the big smoke and is enjoying his time in London. God was good to us - although we 'lost' Scott for a year, a volunteer came forward and has proved a great asset to the Company. Thank you to Colin Scott for all that you have done with the older Boys.

The beginning of 2014 was the time when some of the older Boys were completing higher awards. Adam Boyd, Jordan Henderson, Jack Rennie and John Wilson all achieved their President's Award. Darren Smith completed a course which gained him his Queen's badge, and David Kerr gained his Duke of Edinburgh's Gold award. He was presented with it at Holyrood Palace during July. Congratulations to all of them.

During the school Easter holidays Adam, Jack and Jordan attended an Easter sports camp at Carronvale. Some of the younger Company section Boys went into Glasgow to a pool and Pizza night. May saw 20 members of the Junior Section heading off to the east coast, to Innerwick (near Dunbar) for a weekend's camp. A day at the seabird centre in North Berwick, a day at East Links Family park, attendance at Church in Dunbar and a swim in the pool were the main events. All Boys behaved so well and got on so well together that it was a fabulous weekend. Well done everyone.

### Sparklers Sunday School Report.

This year, we have had about ten Sparklers attending regularly. We have continued to use the Go Teach material,

adapting the programme to suit the ages and interests of the children.

At the start of term we wrote a new Sparklers' Prayer, which the children add to & repeat each week. They can include things which make them happy, people who are ill and anything they are worried about.

Our stories and activities from the New Testament were about the miracles Jesus performed. We also learned about some of the people he befriended, including Zaccaeus. Kings Jehoshaphat and Hezekiah were discussed in our Old Testament lessons. We learned about Jonah and the story of creation.

At Christmas the children enjoyed a bouncy castle and ball games party. The narration for this year's nativity was recorded and everyone enjoyed seeing themselves on the big screen ! We had a fun day out to Monster Mania soft play in Falkirk at the end of June.

Our prize giving service involved the children and teachers of the Sparklers, Sunday School and Bible class – demonstrating that although small in number, we bring lots of enthusiasm & fun to learning more about our Lord.

Next year we hope to look at new teaching materials, different types of children's music & ways to encourage more children to come along.

The Guild year commenced on the 7<sup>th</sup> October 2013 when our friends from Burns & Old Parish Church Guild joined us for our opening meeting on. This year the Guild also felt very much part of the organisation dedication service in October again led by our minister.

Fifty plus members have attended each week with a good representation of men folk especially on open nights. In fact, the Rev Alex Fleming received a Guild tie for his attendance.


