Then he said to his disciples, 'The harvest is plentiful but the workers are few. Ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field." .. Matt. 9:36-38.

With intense clarity and power, Jesus presents to His hearers, and that includes, you and I, the seriousness of the situation; there are sheep, but no one to care for them. There is a harvest ready to be brought in, but there are no workers. However, Jesus is present, and he reaches out

with His deep, compassion and challenges the few, His disciples, not to lose heart, but to petition the Lord of the harvest to supply the obvious need.

We too are challenged to consider the state of our world, nation and church and if that does not bring us to our knees in humble and persevering prayer, nothing will.


# **Holiday Club Event**

# Tips on Saving on your Energy Bills

- 1) Boiling a kettle the kettle doesn't need to be full—only boil enough for what you need. Put the excess into a flask meaning you don't need to boil it up for the next 'cuppa'.
- 2) Swap your bath for a shower and limit the shower to 4 minutes could save £95 year for typical household.
- 3) Washing machine save around £34 year by washing at 30 degrees and reduce your washes to once a week. It's OK to wear the same clothes more than once!
- 4) Avoid using tumble dryers saving around £70 year
- 5) Turn off lights in rooms not in use save around £25 year. Make sure you're replacing traditional lightbulbs with energy saving ones as required.
- 6) Dishwashers cutting use by 1 cycle a week saves around £17 a year.
- 7) Don't leave devices on standby—they still use1/3 of the energy (TVs, computers etc)

### Rebates / Assistance on their way :

- Reduction for Council Tax Payers in Scotland in Band A D of £150 a year
- Every Household connected to the National Grid will receive £400 from the UK Government towards their Energy Costs
- Those receiving a State Pension will receive a 'Winter Fuel Allowance'
- There are other payments for those on certain benefits i.e. Pension Credits, Scottish Disability Benefit

Contact your Council who have Benefit Advisers - free to use Assistance with food supplies at Kilsyth Food Bank—for details see the article on page 4 of this magazine.

Taking this action could not only save on your fuel bills, it will go a long way to help our planet's fight against climate change. Please don't sit home alone and cold this winter and let's watch out for our friends and neighbours.

The editor would like to acknowledge a debt of gratitude to previous editors of the magazine, particularly Margaret Waddell, who has lent her entire stock of back issues along with programmes/notes from other occasions. We were looking through this valuable resource and thought members might appreciate a wee trip down memory lane...

### 2002

3<sup>rd</sup> Kilsyth BB celebrated its 50<sup>th</sup> birthday with a parade accompanied by the Pipe Band. Church teams took part in national table tennis, chess and Badminton competitions. We had a missionary partner, Helen Scott, based at Ekwendeni in Malawi. The minister, Charles MacKinnon, in a football themed letter, complaining about low attendance said, "Like Kilsyth Rangers which once claimed a large and loyal following, so did Christ within the town of Kilsyth...No it's not the done thing to support a losing team or an apparent Loser. Like Jesus. But Christ's day will come – and that's a promise! His, not mine."

### 2007

It was noted that the work party had raised money for the church from a Fiddlers' Night, Summer and Christmas Fayres amounting to over £10,000. There were 23 children in the Sunday school (which was a drop) 23 Sparklers (remember them?) and 50 boys in the BB with one Scott Anderson being commissioned at the parade in August. 3000 Christmas cards were delivered, raising nearly £1000 and the ladies' bowling group had bought a new set of carpet bowls for use by themselves and the men's group.

### 2013

Alan Vint became our minister on 5<sup>th</sup> March and there was an induction social hosted by Rev Graham Atkinson, the interim moderator, and featuring Rev Alex Fleming, the praise group and Gordon McInally who had been the locum minister for the previous 4 years.

### 2017

An afternoon of prayer became a "tradition" to start the new year with the Lord. One poetical prayer went as follows Dear God, we give you thanks for all those volunteers who, in this world of ours, give up - sometimes for many years their precious leisure hours. Their time is freely given and often with a smile. They are, by their good nature driven, to go that extra mile. Amen

### **Christmas Shoe Boxes**

The Girls' Brigade usually pack shoeboxes for Blysthwood Care during October each year. These boxes are then sent to children abroad where this shoebox might be their only Christmas gift they receive. We mostly pack shoeboxes for girls of all ages.

If anyone would like to donate an item to our appeal, below are some of the items we would appreciate. They can be left at the church:

A hat, gloves, tights, socks, small toy, pen /pencils/crayons, notebook or small colouring book, (no story books), soap, toothbrush toothpaste. We also normally add in a t-shirt or leggings to each shoebox. Empty adult shoeboxes are also needed.

Shoeboxes will be delivered to vulnerable people in Ukraine, Albania, Bulgaria, Hungary, Kosovo, Moldova, Romania and Serbia.

# **Presbytery Plan**

After some further discussions with Presbytery, the group working on the plan has accepted our proposals that Anderson and Burns and Old will work together, forming links, having joint services etc for the next few years.

It WILL come that there will be only one minister for Kilsyth, but at the moment Burns and Old will keep the Rev. Bob Johnston and we will keep Rev. K.D. MacLeod with whom we have a very good relationship. By the end of September, we should know exactly what the plan for the whole of Glasgow Presbytery is. Unfortunately that will be too late for this magazine!

### **Finance**

Once again, many thanks to all members of the congregations who give so generously. We are able to pay our way and even have some left over for improvements to the buildings.

Thanks to the generosity of those who 'Drop In' for tea, coffee and a chat on Friday mornings we are able to organise the replacing of the exterior doors to the Church hall

Although Presbytery have stated that no improvements have to be made to premises until the plan is complete, I was able to swing these alterations to make sure that we are 'wind and watertight'! I chanced my arm and got away with it!

### The Manse

As there will be no minister occupying the Manse for the foreseeable future, it has been decided to try to rent it and therefore have an income from it.

Some work has been completed – rooms painted, the utility room refitted, the study upgraded, old fireplaces removed – but there is still some work to be done.

We are trying to get this completed as quickly as possible so that a tenant can begin occupancy before the winter.

I'm hoping, that once it is completely ready, people may be given the opportunity to see inside the Manse.

Your continuing contributions to the Church mean that we can carry out repairs and upgrades to the buildings for the comfort of those using them.


